Boy, 9, arrested after garage fire


Police arrested a 9-year-old boy in connection with a southwest side garage fire Saturday afternoon.

beams of the shed. The city Fire Department responded to the fire at 6:39 p.m. and extinguished the blaze within minutes, officials said.




