Carroll chalked up 19 of his points in the first half as the Boilermakers exploded into a 19-4 lead and posted a 41-20 margin at halftime.

Purdue's biggest lead was 36 points, at 72-36, late in the game.

Illinois 77 Long Beach State 60

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. (UPI) Eddie Johnson scored a career high 38 points and grabbed 13 rebounds Saturday to lead Illinois to a 77-60 victory over Long Beach State.

Mark Smith added 19 points for the Illini, who improved their record to 3-1. Craig Hodges led the 49ers in scoring with 16 points while teammate Francois Wise followed close behind with 15. Long Beach State fell to 3-3.

Johnson scored 9 straight points for the Illini in a five-minute stretch early in the first half to help Illinois pull away from the visitors. Seventeen of Johnson's points came in the first half when the Illini took a 30-28 lead.

Johnson's previous career high was 25 points scored in last year's Glacier Bowl Classic in Alaska.
