While his wife, Linda, and children, Troy and Lori, remain in Toledo, Ohio, Dunbar has been renting a duplex with a few of his assistant coaches.

"We all look at each other and go, 'I got married to avoid this,'" he said during a recent interview in his UNI-Dome office. "We're all going to appreciate our wives very much.

and course record-holder (2:21:45), but she has not raced since dropping out of the Olympics with a stress fracture and a sciatic nerve inflammation, then sustaining another stress fracture four weeks later.

That's why she said, "There is not so much pressure on me because I am not the favorite."

To select a favorite is extremely difficult because the women's field is loaded.

In addition to Pippig, it includes Olympic champion Fatuma Roba of Ethiopia; two-time world cross country champion and 1992 Olympic 10,000-meter gold medalist Derartu Tulu of Ethiopia in her marathon debut; and South African Elana Meyer, the world record-holder in the half-marathon, the third-place finisher at Boston in her marathon debut in 1994 and the runner-up in 1995.

Also competing are 1993 world champion Junko Asari of Japan. 1996 Berlin Marathon winner Colleen De Reuck of South Africa and first-time marathoner Delillah Asiago of Kenya, the women's road racer of the year in 1995 when she won six races.

As in recent years, the U.S. impact is expected to be minimal, even though the New Balance shoe company is offering \$1 million to any American who breaks the men's or women's national record this year.

The top American men are Keith Brantly, 28th at last year's Olympics, and 1993 world cham-

pion Mark Plaatjes, who has been strapped by injuries in recent years. The leading U.S. women are Olga Appell, winner of the 1996 Twin Cities Marathon, and Kim Jones, third at Boston in 1989 and second in 1991 and 1993 but dogged by injuries recently.

The men's American record is 2:08:47 by Bob Kempainen at Boston in 1994 and the women's record is 2:21:21 by Joan Benoit Samuelson at Chicago in 1985.

Ibrahim Hussein, the 1988 Boston winner, began the Kenyans' streak of victories by winning again in 1991 and 1992. He was followed by Ndeti and then Tanui, who finished second in 1995.

This time, as defending champion, the pressure is on Tanui, and Ndeti is happy to deflect it.

Bitok is entered again in the field of about 11,000, along with 1996 fourth-place finisher Lameck Aguta and fifth-place finisher Sammy Lelei, the secondfastest marathoner in history at 2:07:02, giving the Kenyans an awesome group to throw against the Mexicans.

"This is more than an Olympic race because all the world-class athletes are here," Tanui said. "In the Olympics, there are only a few."


